



Notes from the June 11, 2019 meeting of the PHC Knowledge Translation Community of Practice:

“Work2Give: Indigenous and Participatory Knowledge Translation within a Prison-Community Partnership Study”

Helen Brown's research aims to tackle health, criminal justice and social inequities in partnership with rural and remote Indigenous communities. Using arts and community-based, decolonizing and participatory methods she has worked for over 10 years with First Nations communities across Western Canada on projects driven by community priorities and Indigenous perspectives on health, wellness, cultural continuity, restorative justice, land-based healing, and language revitalization. On June 11, she presented a program of research she is leading in partnership with the Correctional Service of Canada and the Tsilhqot'in First Nation that investigates impacts of a prison-community partnership program on Indigenous inmate and community health, well-being and rehabilitation.
